Dear Grace United Church Family & Friends,

- V.I.B.E. (Venturing In Biblical Education) meets every Wednesday evening at 7 p.m. via Zoom and explores our faith journey. At this time we are reading "Living the Questions" – all are welcome to join from anywhere in the world, literally, because we are on Zoom. Just contact me (revtakouhi@terrautopia.ca) and I will add you to the e-mail distribution list. An average of 10 to 12 of us meet weekly.
- And I know, as I trust the Almighty, that there is so much more ministry growth that is waiting for us, we just need to do our best, trust God, and wait patiently without losing hope.

Friends, yes, we are all anxious to get to our regular activities and gatherings, but I sense that like that red-winged bird, sometimes we need to sit with the Peace of God, even when we feel that what is holding us might be a weak stem, but that is held by the Creator, the Rock of Our Salvation. Speaking of birds, I just want to leave you with this image, every morning around 3:30 or 4 a.m. there is a choir of birds singing nearby, and I wake up with their voices and see how dark it is at that time. Your Audio Visual Committee has been very active in working towards improvements to the Sanctuary and to our outreach to the wider community which experiences Grace United Church through the internet, social media, and television. Recently we have started to work with Kingston Sound Works to procure, install, and train us on cameras, computers, video monitors, digital mixers, microphones, and software. These will be used by AV Committee volunteers to transmit live worship and other events to the community. We also plan to enrich the in person experience by upgrading our sound system, improve communications to the hearing impaired, and provide video displays.



To date we have received responses from four volunteers to help operate the equipment and prepare information like slides and video content. If you are interested in being part of this Audio Visual Ministry, please contact Dave Charles or Angus Fergusson. Your commitment is whatever you want it to be. We hope to start testing the new equipment and train operators in late August or early September.

The Grace Virtual Choir is a Labour of Love

Following in the footsteps of so many choirs and orchestras, Grace United Church's Director of Music decided to undertake a virtual choir project. A lot of people think the choir just gets together on Zoom and sings, but nothing could be further from the truth. If you have tried to sing "Happy Birthday" at a Zoom party, you know how badly *that* turned out.

Without going into *too* much detail, here is how a virtual choir is created. First, the director chooses a song and creates a "practice track", which contains the piano accompaniment, the chorister's own part (soprano, alto, tenor or bass) and a loud click to help keep everyone together. Shown here are the first few bars of the alto track.



A recording of this track is emailed to each member of the choir, along with the sheet music, if necessary. Choristers practice singing their own part along with the practice track. When they are confident (or have reached the pinnacle of their confidence), they record a video of themselves singing while listening to the practice track on headphones.

This keeps the sound of the practice track out of their video. All members then send their video to the editor (who, in our case, is also the Musical Director).

Step one in editing is to separate all the audio from the videos and mix together one mass audio recording, with everyone's part synchronized in time. Individual notes in individual parts can be repaired, made louder, softer, lengthened, shortened and otherwise improved.

When the audio is complete, the videos are stacked together and synchronized with the audio. Member's images are sized to look similar and other video edits are made.

A title page is prepared for the beginning and credits for the ending and the Virtual Choir Project is ready to share. Total preparation and editing time: 60 hours.



Major volcano creates urgent plea for Heather Haynes Art of Courage mission

The Worship Planning Team asked Heather Haynes, local artist and humanitarian, to speak in our virtual service about the need for funds to support her work in the Democratic Republic of Congo. Heather, through her art, has been instrumental in establishing an orphanage, school and women's centre in the city of Goma, DRC. She was to speak of the need to support the women who are taking in the orphans who cannot be accommodated by the orphanage.



Then – on May 22nd – Mount Nyiragongo, a volcano located less than 10 kilometres from the city, erupted, sending flowing lava toward Goma. The last eruption, in 2002, flowed right through the centre of the city, resulting in massive destruction. Fortunately, this time, the flow stopped just short of the city limit – for now.

There has been a frantic evacuation of children and women from Goma to the nearby island of Idjwi, where there is a desperate need for funds for food, beds and bedding, medicine and medical personnel. Food is extremely expensive and in very short supply.

Heather appealed to Grace United Church and we are responding in two ways. First, the \$500 donation approved by Stewards from Special Grace Missions was released immediately and forwarded to Heather. Second, we are asking members of our community of faith to respond generously to Heather's appeal. Time is of the essence.



The simplest way to donate is to send a cheque, made out to Grace United Church, to Grace United Church, 120 Pine Street, Gananoque, ON K7G 1C7. Please mark on the cheque "For Volcano Relief". We will see that the funds are forwarded to Heather to alleviate the hardship caused by the sudden, unexpected event.

Getting Second Shot is Key to Return to In-Person Worship

As the world around us starts to slowly move towards normal and the Province of Ontario starts to unfold its Roadmap to Reopening, it is only natural that we should start to wonder "When will it be our turn?" The answer, unfortunately, is not for a while! The situation changes almost daily so it is difficult to predict with any certainty when it will be safe for us to return to our regular services. Here is the picture as we understand it at this time.

The Roadmap to Reopen, the province's three-step plan to safely and gradually lifting public health measures, is based on province-wide vaccination rates and improvements of key health care indicators. As of Friday, June 11th, we entered Step 1. Under the Roadmap, churches may reopen under strict guidelines as part of Step 2. If Covid numbers remain low and vaccination rates reach 70% of adults have received one shot and 20% have received both shots, our province may move to Step 2 in early July. However, the restrictions at that time would include a limit of 15% of the church's capacity. For us that would mean a cap of about 40 people, fewer than our regular attendance on Sunday mornings. We would probably have to use a reservation system and turn away any walk-ins. We would also still be required to maintain social distancing, masks in the building, no singing and no coffee! Certainly not a return to normal services!

Covid remains a very real threat in our province. As our vaccination rates go up, the number of positive cases are going down, but we are not back to zero. A new variant is sweeping through Europe and creeping into Ontario, and there is evidence that one vaccination shot may not provide full protection against this Delta strain. That is why there is a renewed urgency to make sure we all have both shots and are fully vaccinated. That is our best protection. But we also need to continue to follow the guidelines set out by the Ministry of Health regarding masks, social distancing and other precautions.



After much discussion, we have decided to wait at least until we can all come back to church together, and until the risks from variants are significantly reduced. We are hoping we will be able to open our doors again in early fall with a full congregation. It is impossible to set a date when that could happen, but September is the earliest possibility. So many of the variables are out of our control and we still need to be diligent about protecting our community.

There is one thing we can all do to speed up our return to in-person services and that is to make sure we all get fully vaccinated as quickly as possible. We are actually one of the top nations for vaccination rates and some 60% of our adult population have received their first shot. But that means 40% of our community have no protection at all, and we are lagging behind many other nations in the percentage that is fully vaccinated. The best thing you can do to move us forward on our road back to normal is to make sure you and your family,

friends, and neighbours all have both their shots. Let's all do our part, and we will be able to meet in our beautiful sanctuary again! While we are waiting, we will continue with our virtual services on Facebook, YouTube and Cogeco. Take care, and we will eventually get there!

Half Moon Bay, Cancels Season

It is with sadness that the board of directors for Half Moon Bay has decided to cancel this season. We do not have enough clarification surrounding the easing of restrictions with respect to Covid19 to feel comfortable running this season. HMB caters to both American and Canadian worshipers, we are not sure when the border will be opening to allow Americans over to the Canadian side to attend services. The St. Lawrence River is at low water now, the situation will worsen as the summer progresses. There are concerns that the levels are too low for boats to get in and out.
