As we go through life, things are bound to break along the way.


We all experience tragedy ... some more than others.

### **Maintaining our Church Property Never Ends**

The maintenance committee continues with its monthly inspection of the Church's emergency lighting and alarm systems.

The monthly meeting date has been changed to the first Tuesday of the month from the first Thursday. This was due to conflict with a group that rents the Hall on Thursdays. The pie ladies may have to put up with us, should our days conflict.

The problem with the light in the washroom has been fixed. The switch was found to be defective and replaced.

We are working on replacement of an emergency light in the front part of the sanctuary.

The drinking fountain between the washrooms on the lower hall was not draining and a small leak was detected. The drainpipes were removed and reinstalled after cleaning. The drain is now working fine, and no leak is evident. The volume of the spout increased. Now you don't need to bend over quite so far to get a drink.

Our next major project is to make changes to the piping that takes discharge water from the sump pump in the Hall's tables and chairs storage room. In past winters it has been noticed that water from the discharge, makes its way to the sidewalk between the Church property and the Bank of Montreal parking lot. The water can at times freeze, making for a very slippery sidewalk. We hope to have this work completed shortly.

### On Sunday, October 12th,

we will be celebrating Thanksgiving with a special emphasis on the glorious stained-glass windows in our building. Activities will include a scavenger hunt to discover elements of the windows as well as a presentation about the history of their donation, design and installation.



As luck would have it, neither St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church nor Grace United were able to engage pulpit supply for August 24, so we decided to have a joint service in St.



Andrew's sanctuary. The theme was "Water as an Element of Christian Faith", and three presentations were made, by Colleen Harding, Robyn Ableson and Ardie Archer. Robyn and Paul played organ/piano duets for Prelude and Postlude, and an anthem "Wade in the Water" was presented by a choir made jointly of Grace and St. Andrew's members. We invited St. Andrew's to join us for a service on October 19<sup>th</sup>, in which Christina Kaya will present the message, and our brothers and sisters next door gracious voted to worship with us. Participants from both congregations, including their LLWL Emilia Gardiner, will be taking part. The service will be followed by fellowship and refreshments in the downstairs hall. It is our hope that these joint services will happen on a continuing basis.

As Session's responsibilities include worship as well as pastoral care, we are asking our Official Board to urge our new Visioning Team to pursue the possibility of sharing pastoral responsibilities with neighbouring congregations – the Seeley's Bay Pastoral Charge, in particular, who are facing challenges in many ways like our own.



Julie Price is investigating the feasibility of having "Movie Nights" (perhaps at suppertime with pizza available) in our own hall. Licensing can be arranged for the screening of appropriate movies, and these could become popular family events.

A motion was passed unanimously at the September Session meeting, authorizing Director of Music Paul Harding to obtain an estimate from technician Sylvain Brisson for tuning and essential repairs to our pipe organ and report back. Session will report to Official Board that the organ is a cherished and integral part of services and recommend undertaking these repairs. Funding suggestions include the Memorial Fund, sponsorship, a fund-raising campaign for this specific project, a grant from EOORC, or any combination of the same.



Members of the congregation are reminded that sponsorship of special worship expenses, whether candles or trumpeters, are always welcome. Donations can be made to the Church Office (make sure you identify the gift), and tax receipts will be issued. Your generosity is always appreciated. We are planning for a brass ensemble to help us celebrate Christmas on December 21<sup>st</sup>. Can you help?





### Grace United continues to be a presence on YouTube and Cogeco TV

Weekly broadcasts of our worship services continue – we stream live each week to YouTube (barring technical glitches) and the following week at 10:30 a.m. on Cogeco TV Community Channel. Though we have no way of knowing how many viewers watch the service on Cogeco, there is no cost to us for this broadcast so we continue to share our service with Cogeco. The recording of our morning worship is edited by Paul Harding (Cogeco requires our service to be 57.00 minutes – no more, no less); this work takes 1-2 hours each Sunday. YouTube, free as well, provides much more comprehensive statistics, though they may be misleading. We have 143 subscribers – these people are notified each time we publish a service to YouTube. As an example, the September 14<sup>th</sup> service shows 34 views, but the average watch time was 9-1/2 minutes. Martin Hawley's Celebration of Life got 72 views, though a private link was shared with the family and those views are not included. We continue to monitor the quality and value of our media presence in the community.



### Continued support of time and talents is essential

As at August 2025 compared to August 2024, we have had to transfer only \$11,000 from the Trustees compared to an \$80,000 transfer in the prior year. It was a slow summer, but we are still solid.!

I truly need for all of us to congratulate those members in the congregation that not only give their best financially to keep the funds coming in, but they give excessive time to support all the fundraising efforts that have by far surpassed anything received for many years – including revenues from our monthly rentals. I urge every member of our church family to understand how the gift of your time assisting with fundraising and community projects is what is bringing in funds that keep us operating.

We are an aging congregation; however, it is the seniors of our church family that carve out and dedicate the time that has brought the success recognized in our financials as of now. Thank you for staying and preparing our pies, opening, closing the church and moving furniture on stage as required for every concert, staying as our representative for groups using our facilities to run the elevator as required, clean up in our kitchen and again making sure our church is safely locked up after an event. For any church member that perhaps has not been aware of the background volunteer work involved, please consider reaching out to see where you might assist or share an idea for a fundraising event.

We also need to give a shout out to our community members that not only come to support the events we have worked to put on, but they make every effort to come out to concerts, markets, exercise programs that are made available throughout the Town. Many are having a range of struggles at this time and allowing organized social events to help with feelings of isolation, including programs that allow for no cost meals funded from those dollars raised to assist with outreach programs is a wonderful gift we can give. Again, a huge thanks to the gifts of time and dollars from our church family that allow this church to continue to be a hub in the community.


Happy Birthday or Anniversary to all those who are celebrating over the next few months. We pray that what ever your celebration may be, that you are blessed by family and friends.
